Celebrating Dignity of Work

Work Based Learning Experience and Employment Development Skills Programs

For many of us the summer months are a time to take a break but not for our staff at our Easton Office training center and the young adults we serve. In partnership with community resources, we have two important programs in full swing providing crucial employment skills for special needs students ages 18-21.

Work Based Learning Experience (WBLE) is a 5-week program in partnership with Chesapeake College in Queen Anne's County. The College sets up the work sites and funds the cost of the student's wages while Benedictine provides job coaching for the students as they navigate this new experience. Employment Development Skills (EDS) prepares students to search for jobs. This program serves 21 year olds through the special education programs at local high schools. This is a partnership with the Department of Rehabilitative Services (DORS). Benedictine staff prepare students by teaching them how to write resumes, cover letters, secure references and interviewing skills. They also teach soft skills like interpersonal skills, time management and cleanliness as basic as brushing their teeth.

A STUDENT'S JOURNEY MEETING MILESTONES And How His Family Healed

Before coming to Benedictine, the Kraft's son, Sean, attended a special needs preschool program, regional elementary program, and a non-public special education school. The educators were supportive and worked hard with Sean, however, the schools and Sean reaped very little progress in academics and behavior support. Sean grew frustrated and it became difficult for him to lead with his natural kindness and it was challenging for the family. His mother needed to resign from her career to support Sean as he required behavior therapy and constant supervision.

When Sean joined Benedictine he was placed in ABLEs (Academic and Behavioral Learning Environment), Benedictine's program for the most challenged. Within a short couple of years, Sean, who is now 16, has thrived and progressed to where he is now in A Functional Academics classroom. This progress enabled Sean to celebrate his Bar Mitzvah – something he was unable to do prior. And Sean has discovered that he loves cooking and gardening!

The programs at Benedictine touch so many more lives beyond just the students and adults they serve. Sean's whole family is thriving as they have been able to focus on each other and their individual interests. Sean's brother went through a rigorous certification process to move forward with his dream to become a barber. He is the only barber Sean and several of his special needs friends trust to cut their hair. And another beautiful outcome of his success is that he generously donates his services cutting homeless men's hair at the family's synagogue.

Sean's mother was able to return to her teaching career during the pandemic, positively impacting the lives of over 125 children. "My ability to strengthen student academic progress and boost their confidence as learners has meant unmeasurable joy to the students, their parents, and me." – Reenie Kraft.

To show their gratitude and support for Benedictine, Sean's family is giving back to Benedictine in creative ways. Every year for the family birthdays, they have asked their friends and family to donate to Benedictine instead of giving gifts. Their friends have witnessed Sean's growth in person and through their Facebook posts, so it was a natural extension to organize donations to the school through their Facebook pages.

Sean celebrated his Bar Mitzvah recently. Traditionally, monetary gifts received are often saved for college. Instead, Sean's family asked those celebrating Sean's Bar Mitzvah to donate to Benedictine - the school that has made the biggest impact in his life.

"In his case, it's not college... it's Benedictine. We have been so grateful for Sean's amazing progress at Benedictine. To date, Benedictine has received over \$3,800 in donations in Sean's honor." - Reenie Kraft

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

Benedictine's Graphics Department is always busy either screen printing shirts for Chrome City Ride, the Birdies for Benedictine golf tournament or for organizations like the Town of Preston and East Coast Low Voltage. They are also embroidering amazing designs for Queen Anne's County 4-H and many more! With a staff of 9 full time employees including Sister Mary Agnes, they produce over 1600 jobs per year.

The Screen Printing Department was first established in the late 1980's as a component of the vocational training center for students aged 14 and up. It has also been a very important behavior management tool - students knew that they must have good behavior to work in the area. And for others, it helped to calm them down if they were having a difficult day.

CHROME CITY RIDE A Brother's Love and Commitment

The Benedictine campus was gleaming with chrome on Sunday, July 31st, as the 20th annual Chrome City Ride fundraiser made its way back after a two-year hiatus. Spud Blake, the founder of Chrome City Ride, has led a team of dedicated friends and colleagues, mostly in state and local law enforcement, to execute this motorcycle rally ride and car show.

This year's event raised \$100,000 and Benedictine's campus in Ridgely welcomed close to 1,000 riders, drivers and spectators. This event has grown into one of the largest rides in the state.
